Napier Cemetery Walk and Talk

Take a journey of discovery through Hawke's Bay's past with a guided walk through this historic cemetery. You will hear gripping stories of the eventful lives and deaths of local people, touching on missionary work, the New Zealand wars, maritime disasters, the coming of the railways, 19th century burial practices and headstone symbols. This programme is ideal for all schools exploring local history. We also recommend it for schools visiting Napier on school camp.

Seawall Murals Walk and Talk

What is his style and who were his influences? Which of his grand designs made it into reality? The exhibition visit is followed by a tour of some of Louis Hay's buildings close by MTG Hawke's Bay.

Project Banaba

Learn about the history and struggles of the people of this island, which was so heavily mined for phosphate as fertilizer for agriculture in other countries (including New Zealand), that its people had to move elsewhere in 1945.

This multi-media exhibition shows how art can be medium to deliver a message on the use of the world's resources and sustainability.

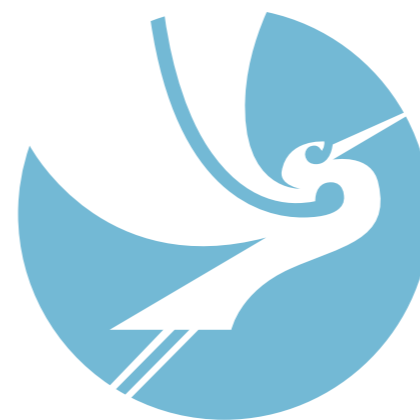


Landscape Painting

MTG is showcasing the landscape paintings of Five Pakeha Painters; Dick Frizzell, Martin Poppelwell, Rita Angus, Geoffrey Fuller and Jenny Campbell. Their view of Hawke's Bay is both traditional and quirky and shows the landscape from their own unique points of view. After a discussion and theory session students will visit the exhibition and sketch some landscapes to lay the foundation for a painting.

Current and upcoming exhibitions

- *The Architectural Legacy Of J. A. Louis Hay* - until 4 August Showcases Louis Hay's hand-drawn architectural plans. Living and worked in Napier, Hay took on the challenge after the 1931 earthquake to help rebuild the town.
- *Silver: Heirlooms from the collection* - ongoing Featuring an eclectic range of unique and intriguing silver objects from the collection.
- *5 Pākehā Painters: Perspectives on Hawke's Bay* - until 1 December Artworks illustrate the way people of European heritage in New Zealand have responded to the land of Hawke's Bay.
- *Project Banaba* - until 1 September Banaba Island was destroyed by environmentally devastating phosphate mining during the 20th century, leading to the total relocation of its people.
- *Rongonui* - 25 May to 26 April 2020 Explore taonga that tell stories of our heritage from the collection of Hawke's Bay Museum Trust, Ruawharo Ta-u-rangi.
- *Feathers and Fibre* - 17 August to 15 March 2020 Rare and wonderful cloaks from the collection focusing on weaving techniques and materials used, from feathers to dog fur.
